The Richardsonian Romanesque style of public buildings is characterized by a straightforward treatment of stone, broad roof planes and a select distribution of openings. The John D. Richardson Dry Goods Co. warehouse in St. Joseph, Missouri is a fine example of this style of architecture which bloomed impressively in the West where cities achieved their first maturity in the heyday of Richardsonian Romanesque architectural style.

The John D. Richardson Dry Goods Co. warehouse is a seven story structure which measures approximately 196 feet along the Third Street facade and 136 feet on the Jules Street facade. The building displays the heaviness, solidity and ruggedness of brick and stone masonry which is characteristic of the style.

The south and east facades are punctuated with transomed windows set deeply into the wall and arranged in groups (singly on the first story, in pairs on the second and third stories, singly on the fourth story and in groups of three on the top three stories) in ribbon-like fashion. At first and fourth floor levels the windows are set in large arched openings without columns or piers.

The terra-cotta faced facades on Jules and Third Street are detailed with Renaissance derivation motifs. Some of these are the scroll shapes, wreaths and garlands which decorate the facades at the fourth floor area and on the southeast and southwest corners of the building.

The main entrance to the building is recessed into an open corner on the first story at the southeast corner (Third and Jules). The opening is supported by a massive granite column with foliated forms on the capital. The ceiling of the entrance is coffered.

The interior of the structure shows the construction of a nearly fireproof structure with steel and concrete load bearing beams and columns. The steel columns vary from floor to floor with the columns becoming smaller as the load weight decreases. The first floor has been remodeled into office space for the present occupant of the building.

Styles of the late 19th century changed with staccato-like speed. But the rich, robust, straightforward design of the Richardsonian style is most eloquently demonstrated in the John D. Richardson Dry Goods Co. warehouse.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The John D. Richardson Dry Goods Co. is significant as a good example of a warehouse designed in the Richardsonian Romanesque style and as the building housing one of St. Joseph, Missouri's most important wholesale companies.

The overall stylistic impression of the building is Richardsonian Romanesque: its massiveness, its use of round arch forms, and its fenestration. This impression is diluted, however, by the robustness that rock faced surfaces might have provided and by the use of Renaissance elements - the rusticated first story and the terra cotta decoration which is classical, not romanesque. This type of free wheeling eclecticism is common in Missouri where since the mid-nineteenth century various concurrent architectural styles have been overlapping and intermixing to produce hybrids of different types. In this instance, the hybridization is understated enough that a clashing effect is not created.

The wholesale merchant has been an important figure in the development of St. Joseph, Missouri. The building being nominated to the National Register has been occupied, successively, by three of the major wholesale firms of the city.

In the 1850's, St. Joseph was the major outfitter for the California/Colorado/Oregonbound wagon trains. From this function prior to the Civil War, St. Joseph grew into one of the three major wholesale centers in the United States--on a par with Chicago and New York City. By the late 1880's and early 1890's seven railroads were operating in and out of the city, there was a massive Union Station, the city boasted a first-class water system and the banks of the city had deposits of over 6 and 1/3 million dollars.

This building was constructed in 1892 for the Richardson, Roberts, Byrne Dry Goods Co. It is adjacent to the Wholesale Row Historic District; is one block west of the Buchanan County Courthouse and two blocks north of the Missouri Valley Trust Company Historic District.

John D. Richardson, the majority stockholder of the dry goods firm, was born in 1847 in Dorchester County, Maryland and emigrated to St. Joseph in 1870. When Richardson arrived in St. Joseph, he was employed by the firm of Donnell and Saxton, one of the earliest business partnerships of the city. Donnell and Saxton were involved in the construction of the St. Joseph and Grand Island Railroad west from St. Joseph. The St. Joseph and Grand Island Railroad incorporated trackage of the Marysville or Palmetto and Roseport Railroad, the first railroad in Kansas. This trackage is now a portion of the Union Pacific System.

By 1882, Richardson had become a partner of John S. Brittain in the Brittain, Richardson & Co. wholesale dry goods firm. The building constructed by this company is a part of Wholesale Row Historic District.

In 1890 Richardson withdrew from the partnership with Brittain and formed his own firm. His partners were Joseph F. Roberts and T.B. Byrne. In 1892 the firm erected this magnificent seven story building at a cost of \$60,000.00. By 1900 the firm had become known as John D. Richardson Dry Goods. In 1901 \$20,000.00 was spent on remodeling the building and in 1917 another \$40,000.00. By this time it was the largest wholesale dry goods plant in the city.

Following the death of Richardson in 1924, the firm remained in business for some years but had disappeared from the St. Joseph scene by 1930.

Richardson was married to Allie Donovan in 1897 at Christ Episcopal Church where he later served many terms as Vestryman. Mrs. Richardson was the sister of John Donovan Jr. who was an organizer of the St. Joseph Stockyards. and was instrumental in attracting several major meat packing houses to St. Joseph.

Following the demise of the Richardson firm, the building stood vacant until about 1940 when the southern portion of the building was occupied by the Kansas City Quartermaster Sub-Depot. Also, in 1940 the northern portion was occupied as a "storeroom" by Wyeth Hardware and Manufacturing Co., another wholesale giant of the city. By 1947, Wyeth had occupied the entire building and remained in occupancy until the building was purchased by American Electric. This latter firm was forced to move from the building they had occupied since 1927 when the Urban Renewal plans for St. Joseph called for the demolition of the structure.


American Electric Co. was founded in 1897 by Luther Reid and E.L. Platt. Platt was apparently an inactive partner in the firm before his death in 1926. Reid was a native of rural North Central Missouri, born on a farm six miles north of Moberly in 1869. He moved to St. Joseph in 1891 where he was employed by Frank Yenawine, the first "electrician" of the city. It was while he was working for Yenawine that Reid conceived the idea of a wholesale electric supply house. The firm has not only served through the years as a wholesaler for electrical contractors but has also held the wholesale franchise for Edison Mazda lamps, Maytag washers, G.E. refrigerators, and Crosley radios, among others. He was an organizer of the Community Chest, the Humane Society, the St. Joseph Rotary Club (now the Downtown Rotary), and the St. Joseph Museum and served on the boards of these groups for many terms.


